- •Getting many yeast infections
- Needle/syringe
- •Insulin Pens
- •Insulin Jet Injectors
- •External Insulin Pumps The following devices are "under construction":
- •Implantable Insulin Pumps
- •Insulin Patch
- •Inhaled Insulin Delivery Patch

- •No age restrictions
- -Youngest user is 12 weeks
- -Oldest user is 88 years
- •99% of users say they feel better than before and would not give up the pump willingly
- •Must be prescribed
